The Warden's Corner

In our efforts to live our mission, to radiate God's love and connect deeply with our own and other's humanity, we are fortunate to have a variety of learning opportunities available in our parish and our community. I want to highlight a resource that has been very helpful to me and others at St E's—the speaker series offered by the Family Action Network, known as FAN. FAN (familyactionnetwork.net) is a non-profit organization that curates a high-quality speaker series, their programs are free and open to the public, the events are designed to inspire, educate and connect people in an effort to create an informed and compassionate community. The events generally coincide with the school year calendar as many of FAN's supporters and beneficiaries are school communities. Before the pandemic all events were in-person opportunities to gather and learn together. Now, there's a mix of virtual (Zoom) and in-person events.

I have many happy memories of attending FAN events, seeing fellow St E's folks in the audience, learning together and having follow up conversations at coffee hours and forums. When thinking about adult formation during the week I spent with Adam at the College of Congregational Development last summer, and in sharing data we gathered as part of our CCD project with parishioners during the "Forum on Forums" in November, FAN events came to mind as a wonderful way to learn in our community. During the November forum, the group discussed attending FAN events, either watching a Zoom together or attending in-person to share fellowship, learning and conversation.

There are many FAN events scheduled for April and May, but one stands out as a fun field trip opportunity for us—the amazing author, Anne Lamott, is speaking at Loyola Academy in Wilmette on April 23rd! This should be a really special program, she will be speaking about her new book, *Somehow: Thoughts on Love.* Even more remarkable, FAN will be giving away 200 copies of the book to attendees! Here's a brief description of the event from the FAN website:

In *Somehow: Thoughts on Love*, beloved bestselling author **Anne Lamott** explores the transformative power that love has in our lives: how it surprises us, forces us to confront uncomfortable truths, reminds us of our humanity, and guides us forward. "Love just won't be pinned down," she says. "It is in our very atmosphere" and lies at the heart of who we are. We are, Lamott says, creatures of love.

In each chapter of *Somehow*, Lamott refracts all the colors of the spectrum. She explores the unexpected love for a partner later in life. The bruised (and bruising) love for a child who disappoints, even frightens. The sustaining love among a group of sinners, for a community in transition, in the wider world. The lessons she underscores are that love enlightens as it educates, comforts as it energizes, sustains as it surprises.

Lamott will be in conversation with Heidi Stevens, Director of External Affairs for the University of Chicago's TMW Center for Early Learning + Public Health, and creative director for Parent Nation, an initiative of the TMW Center. Prior to joining TMW, Stevens worked at the *Chicago Tribune* for 23 years, where she wrote a daily column called "Balancing Act."

More information about carpooling and who's going will be coming in the bulletin, announcements and ereflects, but please save the date—April 23rd at 7pm—and make your plans to attend this wonderful learning and fellowship opportunity. You may want to arrive a little early to make sure you get a book! Soup Kitchen

For some 30 years we have been partnering with First United Methodist Church of Evanston to staff a soup kitchen 6 times a year. Typically we take **the second Thursday of every odd numbered month** (January, March, etc.). We provide the food and the volunteers to pack and serve that food. The time requirement is not great: either 1-2 hours in the afternoon in Glencoe and/or 2-3 hours in the early evening in Evanston.

Family Promise needs Volunteers

Family Promise provides free family shelter to families with children – keeping families together during a time of homelessness, unlike other homeless shelters separate families by female/male. Family Promise also offers training, budgeting and other support to help families move from homelessness to success. Because St. Elisabeth cannot house families in our church; we partner with two other churches.

We need volunteers to help cook meals, stay overnight or just help serve meals. Homeless families with children want someone to talk with and someone to interact with their children.



We help three to five times per year for one week at a time. There is a sign-up online for dinners or sleepovers. It is easy, helpful, fulfilling and very efficient. It is good to share a meal with people in need.


St. Elisabeth's Bible Study

The following was taken from "Orphan's" website. What an interesting history!

Orphans of the Storm Animal Shelter was founded in 1928 by the world-renowned dancer, actor, and entrepreneur Irene Castle and her friend Helen Swift. Irene named Orphans of the Storm after her favorite silent movie by the same name, in which two orphaned sisters are reunited. It was Irene's hope to provide a happy ending to lost and abandoned dogs and cats in

the Chicago area. Irene Castle and her first husband, Vernon, were famous ballroom dancers portrayed in the movie The Story of Vernon and Irene Castle by Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers. After Vernon passed, Irene married Major Frederick McLaughlin, founder of the Chicago Blackhawks. They settled in Lake Forest, and Irene found an abandoned kennel in nearby Riverwoods, the site of what would become Orphans of the Storm.

Is Revenge Ever an Appropriate Response to Wrongdoing?

St. E's Book Group will discuss **Hekabe** by Euripides at its regular meeting, April 9. The group meets at noon in the guild room for a brown bag lunch and lively discussion. Revenge, it's an age-old theme, one which has been consider by playwrights as long ago as ancient Greece. In his play **Hekabe**, Euripides dramatizes three myths about the aftermath of the Trojan War. Through the character portraying the former Queen of Troy, he explores ideas about (1) Justice and Punishment and (2) the individual and the civic world.

The play is the first literary selection in the Great Books Foundation's anthology, **Great Conversations 5.** If you enjoy discussing what you read, consider becoming a member of the Book Group. The readings are short and have been selected for their multifaceted levels of meaning. No special expertise or background information is needed. Discussions center on your interpretation of the ideas presented in the text. There are no right or wrong answers. Drop in are always welcome.
