

# View from The Pulpit

"You won't see much of me this summer once golf gets going," a parishioner told me the other day.

And they are not alone. A colleague from another Christian denomination joked with me that **his** church had church **all summer long** unlike we Episcopalians. We **do** go away in the summer. Some of us have summer homes, we take vacations, we go to visit family in far off places. Church attendance dips down in the summer and the general sense is that things slow down to a crawl as far as parish events. I'm sure some of my priestly colleagues and fellow pastors get all huffy about this. But I don't.

I'm used to it. My childhood Unitarian Universalist church took summers off too. They didn't have regular services at all in the summer with music and readings and sermons. Instead they met in a circle of chairs in the church office for a discussion or meditation moderated by a member of the congregation.


At the end of the summer, when they came back together for their first "regular" service of the year in September, they practiced what they called "Water Communion." They put a big bowl in the front of the church and they poured in some water from last year's service. And then, one by one, member by member, family by family, folks came forward with baby food jars and pickle jars and water bottles and medicine bottles and they poured into the bowl the water that they had gathered on their summer adventures. Water from the Snake River out West and kayaking on Lake Superior and tap water from the hotel room in Paris and from the hospital where so and so had their appendix removed, water from the funeral home where Nama's Wake was held and from the Jordan River and a little rum from the Caribbean mixed with warm Gulf seawater.

The idea was that the summer was sacred time too. You know me by now - I'm a big fan of Saint Ignatius of Loyola. And one of Ignatius's big themes was "finding God in all things." Because God is with us in all things. It's the badly kept secret some of my fellow clergy seem loathe to share broadly: you don't need to come to Church to experience the Sacred. God is with you on vacation, on the beach, in the mountains, with your family and yes even out on the golf course.

So that's my challenge to you this summer. Seek God where-ever you find yourself. Thank God for the blessings and joys, for the adventure and the journeys, the ups and the downs. Bring your life to God and invite God into your life, one lazy summer afternoon at a time. Wherever these months take you.

And then in the fall, come back and tell us all about it. Water optional.


#### Summer Office Hours

# St. E's Book Group Summertime Reading

In June, a redo: 3 John Keats Odes Later, Iris Murdoch's novel, *The Bell* 



By popular demand, St. E's Book Group will discuss "Ode to a Nightingale," "Ode to a Grecian Urn," and "Ode on Melancholy" at its monthly meeting, Tuesday, June 11, at noon, on the patio, weather permitting. Bring a brown bag lunch. Keats explores themes on artistic creativity and the dimensions of imagination and asks the question do art and music convey a wisdom beyond that which is discovered in literature. The poems can be found on line or in the Great Books Foundation's anthology, **Great Conversations 5.** 

Later in the summer, the group will gather at a date to be determined to discuss **The Bell.** Published in 1958, the novel urges the reader to imagine other people's stories. An acclaimed author, Murdoch is skilled in blending social satire with a keen, compassionate view of her characters. In **The Bell** considers whether moral absolutes must be modified to accommodate human nature. As always, Book Group's discussions center on your interpretation of the ideas
